From the unprecedented success of mining at the legislature to the complete upheaval of the state political landscape, 2018 will undoubtedly go down in history as one of the most active for the Tennessee Mining Association.

110th General Assembly

The passage of the 90-page Primacy and Reclamation Act of Tennessee during this year's legislature generated more excitement and praise of TMA than any in our history. After working for four years to secure victory, the legislature voted by an overwhelming majority to return oversight of the coal industry to the state. In addition, TMA was responsible for keeping the legislature from establishing a severance tax on the zinc industry and participated in a coalition to pass legislation affirming a state permit shield.

Mid-Term Elections

With a Senate race of national importance, one of the most competitive gubernatorial primaries in state history and a turnover of more than 25 percent in the state legislature, 2018 completely shifted the state's political landscape. TMA was active throughout the campaign season meeting with candidates on the local, state and federal level to ensure that mining's issues remain front and center on the mind of policymakers.

Tennessee Natural Resources Development PAC





KOPPERGLO MINING, LLC

Tennessee-based coal company Kopper Glo Mining, LLC were the winners of the 2017 Sentinels of Safety Award for the Small Underground Coal Group for recording 70,238 accident-free hours at their Cooper Ridge Deep Mine.

Presented by the National Mining Association, the Sentinels of Safety Award is the nation's most prestigious mine safety honor. Kopper Glo's win represents the first time in the award's 93-year history that a Tennessee coal mine has been honored.

Across Kopper Glo Mining's operations, the safety and welfare of employees is the first and foremost priority. The company relies on input and recommendations of those closest to the mining operations to ensure that the mission of returning home safely at the end of each shift is achieved.

Tennessee Consolidated Coal Co.'s Lane Cove Strip Mine #2 and Deep Mine #43 were awarded both the State and Regional Appalachian Regional Reforestation Award for their implementation of the Forestry Reclamation Approach. Lead by Bernard "Chico" Higgins, TCC successfully prepped the site for tree planting with a novel "push up" technique and then hosted the 2018 Arbor Day event where students from Whitwell Middle School were able to participate in the reforestation efforts, which will lead to improved wildlife habitat, environmental health and longterm economic growth through timber.
